


# **Quarterly Report**


### Overall Update of Girl Child education Programme (GCEP)

### Formal inauguration of new centres

We're excited to share some major milestones with the launch of 61 new learning centres in Uttarakhand supported by Titan. This includes 40 new centres in the Naugaon and Purola blocks of Uttarkashi district and 21 in Udham Singh Nagar.

In August, we celebrated the official inauguration of several new learning centres.

Sunali (LC-03087) and Netri (LC-03083) were inaugurated by Titan representatives Ms. Shanti PS.Preeti Munjal and the IIMPACT field team along with Mr. Bhart Patwal and the IDS team were also in attendance. Shree Rampur (LC-03059) saw an enthusiastic crowd of 170 people for its inauguration led by Mr. Dominic from Titan, while Buksaura (LC-03062) was inaugurated by Ms. Shanti with 130 attendees.


It was a memorable occasion for the community, and we're excited to see these centres empowering students.





### Teachers web app

Training on the live Quarterly Teacher's Assessment (QTA) through the teacher's web app has been successfully completed across all regions in seven batches. The training sessions were divided into two groups: one for the field team and the other for the implementation team, ensuring comprehensive coverage and skill development for both groups.

# **Training and Capacity Building**

All quarterly teacher trainings for Q2 were successfully completed by July. Additional support and guidance continued throughout the quarter.




- A three day webinar organised by Bharati Foundation on Ganit Mahotsav with an objective to help tackle Maths phobia.
- Life skills sessions on Stress Management and Problem Solving were conducted as part of UNICEF's Module-2. These sessions equipped teachers with practical tools to effectively manage challenges, enhancing their ability to handle stress and solve problems.
- Virtual quality checks for teachers focusing on Language and Mathematics.
- 20 virtual sessions conducted on the development of the Teacher's Guide
- Region wise preparatory sessions on conducting the Quarterly Teacher Trainings with 120 participants attending the sessions.
- A core group has been formed to develop a guide for teachers.
  Quarterly Teacher Training preparatory session for Resource pool was organised.

## **Assessments**


As in every quarter, assessments were conducted for both teachers and students.

### **Quarterly Teacher Assessment**



The overall average score of Quarterly Teacher Assessment in Language is 73.4%, Maths 82.7%, English 72% and EVS 87.1% respectively leading to an overall average of 78.8%.

### **Quarterly Girls Assessment**



The overall average score of Quarterly Girl's Assessment is 73%, with average percentage in Maths being 70.3%, English 72.9%, Language 74.9% and EVS 72.8% Following the analysis of last quarter's oral assessment results, an implementation plan has been developed to address the identified gaps. With the support of our partners and the community, this plan aims to enhance student learning outcomes through targeted interventions and strategies. The collaborative effort will focus on personalized learning approaches, strengthening foundational skills, and providing the necessary resources to help students reach their full potential.

### Our Intervention plan

### Mathematics

- Assess students' current understanding of division through simple tests or observations.
- Simplify division using real-life examples like dividing crops or sharing resources.
- Use hands-on materials such as pebbles, sticks, or fruits to demonstrate division practically.
- Encourage peer learning where students explain division concepts to each other.
- Introduce engaging math games and activities involving division.
- Conduct quarterly teacher training focused on interactive methods for teaching division.
- Provide teachers with low-cost teaching aids like handmade charts and local materials.
- Use culturally relevant examples to make learning more relatable for students.
- Involve parents and the community in supporting math education through events like math fairs.

### English

- Implement daily reading sessions (silent or aloud).
- Pair strong readers with weaker ones for peer support.
- Use storytelling to teach new vocabulary and concepts.
- Ask comprehension questions, starting simple and progressing in complexity.
- Introduce a "Word of the Day" and encourage usage in sentences.
- Create a "Word Wall" for students to add and refer to new words.


## Diya Rana's Journey of Transformation

Diya Rana, a 13-year-old girl from Ray Bandh village in Bankura Block-2, is a shining example of how access to quality education can transform lives. Coming from a middle-class family where the education of girls was not prioritized, Diya's future seemed limited by cultural norms that favoured household duties over schooling for girls. However, in 2020, her life took a different turn when she joined the Ray Band Learning Centre (LC) under the Girl Child Education Programme.

Diya's father runs a small business, and her mother is a housewife, but Diya always had a keen interest in learning beyond the traditional curriculum. The Learning Centre gave her the opportunity to explore new educational avenues, sparking her passion for knowledge. Over the years, her academic performance improved significantly, and by 2023, she successfully graduated from the LC and transitioned into the formal education system, now studying in Class VII.

Despite leaving the LC, Diya remains deeply connected to it. She often returns to mentor younger students, assist teachers, conduct home visits, and encourage new children to attend the Centre. Her involvement in different celebrations and activities has revealed her leadership qualities, confidence, and willingness to help others.

Diya's journey from a shy girl in a culturally restrictive environment to an aspiring teacher highlights the profound impact that educational initiatives can have on children's lives. Her story demonstrates the importance of providing equal educational opportunities to all children, regardless of their socioeconomic background, and showcases how organizations like IIMPACT are bridging the educational gap in underserved communities. Priyanka Mahato, an alumna of Chipida Learning Centre, made a courageous stand against her own child marriage, thanks to her knowledge gained through the Aarambh Manch platform. At 15, when her family arranged her marriage, Priyanka, aware of the consequences, sought help from her teacher. The teacher involved Kanyashree officials and the child helpline, successfully stopping the marriage.

On 14th August, she was honored with a cash prize of 5000 rupees and a certificate by Sabhapati and MP, along with a monthly stipend of 4000 rupees to support her education. Her bravery also earned her a special award at the Kolkata Birangana State Government office.

Priyanka's story exemplifies the impact of the Girl Child Education Programme and Aarambh Manch in empowering young girls to challenge societal norms and secure their futures.
